Friends,

Sorry this one ran so long. Surgeries have gone well the past two days. I am still struggling with the capsulorrhexis, and the cases still take forever compared with the rate a practiced surgeon proceeds- but there is a very good procedure here. My worst corneal edema (first patient, from banging the cornea with the lens during extraction) looks better than just about any of the resident extracaps I remember from years ago. Many (maybe not most, but many) of the eyes are 20/20 uncorrected on post op day 1. Nearly all are 20/40 or better on POD1. I have been seeing as many post ops as possible to see what good and bad looks like – and most of these eyes look GREAT. Thanks to all - Joe
