
Salud Juntos Winter 2011 Brigade to Punta Ocote

Salud Juntos Staff of the Day



Dale Reiger from Seattle, WA, is Treasurer and past President of Salud Juntos, an organization which emphasizes community health in Honduras via training and mobilization of promotoras. He founded Salud Juntos with his son, Sheridan, over three years ago. Dale had sold his international export business and retired at age 47. He was looking for more rewarding non-profit work than Seattle afforded. After reading *Mountains Beyond Mountains*, he set his sights overseas.

A chance encounter led to meetings with Terry Tack, OD, and the first eye Brigade to La Guacamaya in 2008. Dale recalls how they gave sight back to a keratoconus patient who had, until then, never seen his children. It was a seminal moment that led to the birth of Salud Juntos, which gained non-profit status shortly thereafter.

Dale is a globe trotter, having visited Asia 29 times, Central America 14 times, and Europe 11 times. This Brigade constitutes his 54th international trip. His other interests include acrylic and oil painting, glass firing, and playwriting. His art will be exhibited this March and he is collaborating with his girlfriend, Teri Jo Summer, on installation work. More info is at *shiningseastudios.com*.



Joseph Miller, MD, MPH (right), is Head of the Department of Ophthalmology and Vision Science. He completed his residency at Yale, where his training included three months of cataract surgery at Princess Margaret Hospital in the Bahamas. After completing his fellowship in pediatric ophthalmology at Johns Hopkins in 1991, he joined the Department, which has been home ever since.

From the outset, he volunteered across the border in Nogales, Sonora, performing surgeries with Dra. Ramirez. He joined the Navy Reserves after September 11 and served on medical missions to Cameroon. He connected with Salud Juntos via Mindy Fain, who was recruiting physicians for the La Guacamaya clinic, though ultimately his first Brigade was to Punta Ocote in 2009 with his daughter, Laura.

Concurrently, plans were being made for an ophthalmology residency at UPH. The Eye Brigades fulfilled this program's goal of improving care for the underserved. Residents who participate in the Brigades gain the experience and confidence to organize and carry out their own Brigades in the future.

This was Dr. Miller's third Brigade. They have taught him to be grateful for the things we take for granted at home, for example water fountains with clean drinking water on demand. He is married to Sarah, his wife of 30+ years. They have two daughters, Emily and Laura. His hobbies include running, cycling, photography, ham radio (his call sign is KI7WV), and the weather.
